



- A place to host your own family tree






















### Co. Galway Parish Records






Irish Census Search forms 1841 & 1851. The government used these forms to search the 1841 & 1851 Census to prove the age of people applying for the Old Age Pension when birth certificates did not exist because the person was born before Civil Registration had begun. The census search forms contain the applicant's name, address, residence in 1851 with county, barony, parish, townland and street as well as the parent's names and head of household in 1851. This collection was originally captured at the National Archives of Ireland and the index was created by FindMyPast.com.



#### What Is In the Collection?

When you are in FamilySearch, looking through the Historical Record Collections and are looking at a collection list, you will see some collections with a camera icon next to the collection and some without the camera icon. The camera icon tells you that this record collection has digitized images of each record within that collection. If no icon is shown, there will not be images available.

#### Images or Indexed?

- To the right of the collection title, you will see either the words **Browse Images** or you will see a number. If you see a number, that means the collection has been indexed and that the number indicates how many records are in the collection.
- If you see the words Browse Images, this means that the collection has not been indexed

## Wiki Helps for FamilySearch Record Collections

Did you know that understanding a document's background is an important part of quality family history research? People wanting to use documents for genealogical research should understand "why and under what circumstances the records were created" because "by understanding the creation, purpose, and use of genealogical records ... genealogists can then effectively use, interpret, and evaluate the information in those records"

# Record Images

#### **Creation of Records**

Because family history depends on finding records about individuals and families, you should understand the nature of the records that you will be searching. In fact, one requirement of the Genealogical Proof Standard is that "the data's background context [be] considered." This means, among other things, understanding why and under what circumstances the records were created.

# **Genealogical Proof Standard**

- The purpose of the Genealogical Proof Standard is to show what the minimums are that a genealogist must do for his or her work to be credible.
- There are five elements to the Genealogical Proof Standard:
- A reasonably exhaustive search has been conducted.
- Each statement of fact has a complete and accurate source citation.
- The evidence is reliable, and has been skillfully correlated and interpreted.
- Any contradictory evidence has been resolved.
- The conclusion has been soundly reasoned.
- Any proof statement is subject to re-evaluation when new evidence arises.

# **Advantages of Collections**

- Firstly, you can refine your search to a specific country or region
- Secondly, you can refine your search to a more specific time frame
- Thirdly, you can refine your search to a specific type of record

# Search Tips for FamilySearch Historical Records

There are SO many records online at FamilySearch now that a general search often turns up hundreds if not thousands of irrelevant results. Sometimes this leads people to claim that FamilySearch has nothing on their family. Do keep in mind as you search, however, that these are historical records. While FamilySearch does have some records with information on living or recently deceased individuals, this is not true of the majority of their collections.

#### Tip Page One

- Check the Exact Search Boxes When you're getting a lot of irrelevant results, try checking the exact search boxes next to the names and other information you're fairly confident of.
- Try Using Wildcards FamilySearch recognizes both the \* wildcard (replaces one or more characters) and the ? wildcard (replaces a single character). Wildcard searches work both with and without exact search.

#### Tip Page Two

• Narrow by Date or Event — Select a life event (birth, marriage, residence, death or any) to narrow your search by a particular date and event (e.g. someone born in Ireland about 1850). Residence search is the one I use most.

#### Tip Page Three

 Narrow by Relationship — Select Spouse, Parents, or Other Person to narrow your search by entering either the name of a parent, spouse or possible sibling/associate. This search technique is especially useful for locating siblings - just enter the surnames of both the mother and the father and leave everything else blank. If the two surnames are common you may need to also add one or both first names, or narrow by location. You can also use this technique when searching a particular record collection.

#### **Tip Page Four**

 Search by Collection – A general search almost never works well for me unless I'm searching for someone with a very unusual name. For best results, I almost always start a new search at FamilySearch by browsing by location down to a particular record collection (e.g. Ireland Marriages, 1619-1898). You can also use the "Narrow by Relationship" technique discussed above within each collection.

#### Tip Page Five

 Show Preview — Once your search has returned a list of results, click on the little upside-down triangle to the right of each search result to open a more detailed preview. This reduces the time than clicking back and forth between the results list and the result pages.

#### Tip Page Six

• Filter Your Results - If you're searching across multiple collections at one time, use the Category list in the left-hand navigation bar to narrow your results by category. This is useful for filtering out census records, for example, which often end up topping results lists. Once you've narrowed to a particular category (Births, Marriages & Deaths, for example), the left-hand nav bar will list record collections within that category, with the number of results that match your search query next to each collection title.


#### Tip Page Seven

• Browse as Well as Search - Many collections at FamilySearch are only partially searchable at any given point in time, and this information isn't always easy to determine from the collection list. Even if a particular collection is searchable, try comparing the total number of searchable records listed in the Collections List with the total number of records available if you select the record set and scroll down to see the number of records listed under "View Images in this Collection." In many cases you will find there are many records available for browsing that aren't yet included in the searchable index.




# What is a Catalog?


- The Catalog is a guide to birth, marriage, and death records; census records; church registers; books; periodicals; family histories and many other records that contain genealogical information. These records may be searchable online, on microfiche or microfilm, in a book or in a computer file.
- Some entries in the FamilySearch Catalog include images of records. When an image is available in the catalog, a camera icon will appear to the right of the microfilm note associated with that image.
